Families may need help with:

- law enforcement investigation information
- search & rescue information
- legislation clarification
- estate issues
- child care
- respite
- nutrition
- media relations
- social media awareness

Missing Persons Liaisons provide direct support to families by:

Offering support

- supporting hope
- listening
- critical thinking
- priorities management
- Family Toolkit

Providing information about

- investigation updates
- search and rescue
- missing persons legislation
- ambiguous loss

Referrals to relevant agencies for

- financial aid
- specialized counselling for ambiguous loss
- issues regarding childcare / respite / estate / property

Missing Persons Liaisons provide consultation services to all Policebased Victim Services units within Saskatchewan. This makes support services available to all families of missing persons in Saskatchewan.

Reporting missing persons:

- There is no waiting period to report someone missing. Report as soon as usual methods to locate have been unsuccessful.
- A missing persons report can be filed at your nearest law enforcement agency.
- Anyone can report someone missing. This includes a family member, friend, co-worker, etc.
- All unsolved missing persons investigations remain active until resolution is reached.
- Report persons missing even if they have gone missing in the past.
